The 2nd and third year groups were held on 2nd and 4th Friday from 12.45 to 1.30 PM (Total 35 groups) Total 36 mentor classes were held during the session 2019-20. Main objectives attained during these classes are public speaking, motivating the students for participation in the college activities. During the classes discussion on environmental issues, role and aim of education in one's life and college related problems. With reference to memo no 27/133-2019 co-ord (i) dated 10/02/2020 book review activity was organized in the college on 29.02.2020. Further in addition to above activities significance of voting was also discussed with the students and they were encouraged to cast their votes and help their friends and family members to know their voting rights. Training of two wheelers was given to the students in college campus by the city administration and the driving licenses also issued to the students. Even semester starts from 01.01.2020 for UG/PG classes in physical mode. During the lockdown period online classes were organized to complete the syllabus and the session ended on 31.05.2020. Even Sem practical and theory exams were conducted from 25.09.2020 to 26.10.2020 in online/ offline mode by following the preventive measures of Covid-19 as per the guidelines of MHRD and state govt.
